Experienced Chinese classrooms for the first time ever. Went to a University "lecture" room first followed by a Wuhan middle school the day after. Chinese classrooms are quite similar in general but for some reason, the Wuhan Middle schools had so much more funding to develop their classrooms in comparison to the University!! Seems entirely possible since University here is actually extremely cheap in comparison to Australia. Speaking of comparisons with Australia, Chinese classrooms have MUCH smaller tables, still use blackboards (which I find so much cooler than whiteboards), and has such an old-school design that I find surprisingly cosy. I have NO idea how these students keep awake during the classes.

I was invited by Yinghui to join one of her Urban Design classes and although I probably only understood 50% of the class, I found it extremely intriguing. The perspective that China takes towards urban planning I feel (from my lack of expertise), vary slightly from Australia's perspective of urban planning. China's urban planning is focused on gaining the most money from surrounding properties by developing the urban space in between. It is heavily money-oriented and often, the developments are insufficient for the social sector to use. Examples of these are a lack of benches, trees, resting areas and shade in an urban park.

It may be engrained in Wuhan's culture and how it makes Wuhan unique.
